Share the Plate April

Groundwork Milwaukee is a nonprofit organization and land trust. Their mission is to bring about the sustained regeneration, improvement and management of the physical environment by developing community-based partnerships that empower people, businesses and organizations to promote environmental, economic and social well-being.

The work is primarily done through (1) the transformation of brownfields into community spaces including gardens, orchards, art exhibits, and gathering places; (2) the facilitation of programs that are designed to educate, train, and empower youth, community members, veterans, and volunteers; and (3) the protection of urban waters through the installation of rain water harvesting structures, the strategic integration of green infrastructure, and habitat restoration for aquatic native species.

Their current report, Milwaukee Flood Health Vulnerability Assessment, and the Storymap that accompanies it tell of the history of housing discrimination in Milwaukee, and the impacts of climate change in one neighborhood, Metcalfe Park. They have spent the last year assisting neighbors developing and installing green solutions in areas which are vulnerable to flood and extreme heat. Learn more at www.groundworkmke.org.

There's a game where everyone stands in a circle and throws a ball of yarn across the circle, person to person, until they create complicated interconnected web. When someone pulls on their piece of the web, the whole web moves. If someone lets go of their piece of the web, the whole web suffers. In communities, ecosystems, even our own bodies, there is an interdependent web of connection, where symbiotic entities influence and rely on one another.

In Unitarian Universalism, we honor the interdependent web of all existence. Recognizing our interdependence pulls us back from the brink of isolation and invites into covenant with the larger whole of which we are just one part.

When we create covenant, we commit to practicing right relationship and repairing damaged relationships. We return to covenant and repair over and over again in the long and complicated life dance of interdependent relationships among our beloveds, our communities, our own bodies, and the earth itself. This month at church, let's explore together what it means to hold up our part of the yarn, and hold our people, non-human beings, and the land well. On Earth Day, our Earth Justice Ministry will be writing postcards connecting climate and democracy. Throughout April, our Board of Trustees will be asking your opinion about how the church is doing in our web of relationships with their congregational survey, found on page 13. In Religious Education (RE), we will be hiring a new RE and Membership Assistant to join our team. Let's keep holding our piece of the yarn, and one another, this month!

Kimberlee's Contemplations

At General Assembly this summer, UUs will vote on expressing our faith with values, rather than just with principles. This is often referred to as **Article II**, since that is where our principles and purposes are in our UUA bylaws. If you would like to read the proposed revision to Article II, you can find it **here**.

The values start with a word, then a statement expanding on the value, followed by action. As an example, our theme this month is Interdependence, which is one of the proposed values. Here is the language: Interdependence. We honor the interdependent web of all existence. With reverence for the great web of life and with humility, we acknowledge our place in it. We covenant to protect Earth and all beings from exploitation. We will create and nurture sustainable relationships of care and respect, mutuality and justice. We will work to repair harm and damaged relationships.

To help our children engage in this process and important discussion, UU religious educators around the world have been utilizing an acronym of the values centering on love—JET PIG. JET PIG flies around love sharing the values of Justice, Equity, Transformation, Pluralism, Interdependence, and Generosity. Our JET PIG lives on the lower level in my office. They have an adorable helmet and jet backpack filled with wooden hearts with each of the values written on them, a water bottle and notebook. The children adore JET PIG! What I am most delighted by is that the one-word values have been a marvelous tool for our children to help understand and articulate Unitarian Universalism.

As a seasoned religious educator who has taught the principles to young people for the past 20 years, I find few of our young people know our principles. There have been songs, there have been lessons, there has been much, but overall they remain unknown. I've been teaching the values and this potential change for less than a year and many of the children can now list the values and have some understanding of their meaning. This is an unexpected joy and to hear the next generation of UUs be able to articulate their faith using these cornerstones is powerful!

Interdependence is all about understanding how we belong to one another. I am trying to embrace our interdependence with fellow UUs and I encourage you to join me in staying open to whatever outcome we decide on together.

I invite you to come meet JET PIG who will be at the RE table this month!

Margo had struggled bronchiectasis, for over 20 years, and had been receiving hospice care this month. She was 83 years old. Margo and Jim were married for 63 years, they have been members of First Church for the past 29 years. Margo was a respected Career Counselor and wrote articles for the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel.

St. John's chaplain, Nancy Leafblad, accompanied and supported Nelson at the end of his life sitting with him and holding his hand in his final hours of consciousness.

Nelson died without living relatives, and Saint John's recently learned of his connection with us and shared the news of his death. Nelson was 81 years old and a member of First Church since 2004. He was a reserved, kind man, who was part of the second-service coffee hour crew for many years. We lit the Candle of Life for Nelson during worship on Sunday, March 3, 2024.

I know from personal experience that life can be challenging at times—we can experience sickness, job loss, other life transitions, broken hearts and/or bodies. Life can also bring much joy, as in the birth or adoption of a child. Here at First Church, we want to support you during these times of joy and sorrow. A PCA offers a compassionate presence and a listening ear and connects with members in-person or via email, text, and phone calls. Sometimes a PCA connects via FaceTime, Skype, or Zoom, depending on the situation.

PCAs serve for 3 years, and this fall 2024, we would like to recruit 10 new PCAs. If you are interested or contacted, you will be asked to complete an online application and will be interviewed. If you are selected, you will be required to attend 20 hours of training in September and October. Following the training, you can make a final decision to proceed as a PCA. Child Dedication Ritual in May

On May 12, a Dedication of Parents and Children will take place during our 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services. The Child Dedication Ceremony is a time for celebrating the birth or adoption of a child in a ceremony of naming and dedication. It is a time for welcoming our children into the world, into the family and into the church community. It is a time for acknowledging that each child's life is sacred and hold that truth in the light of our faith.

This simple ceremony is related to the Christian "baptism" or "christening," though the meanings we attach to it are significantly different.

The ceremony is a public declaration by the parents to dedicate themselves to faithfully nurture and support their children. The congregation recognizes your child's original blessing, and we dedicate ourselves to nurturing your child and you. Because of the promises our congregation makes to the family during the ceremony, child dedications are available only to members of the church.

Vote "NO" on April Referendums on Elections

The Wisconsin Constitution would be amended if two election referendums on the April 2 election ballot were approved by voters. One amendment would bar the use of private funds or donations by municipal election administrators. The other would underscore that only election officials designated by law can run elections.

Supporters of the constitutional amendments say their motivation is to increase election integrity or reduce the appearance of impropriety. The non-partisan League of Women Voters of Wisconsin recommends a "no" vote, saying the referendum questions are rooted in disinformation, could decrease election funding, lengthen waiting times at the polls, and make election clerks' jobs harder.

The changes to the constitution were proposed by Republican legislators after the 2020 elections, when private donations helped many municipalities in Wisconsin navigate election administration challenges early in the COVID-19 pandemic.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Wisconsin also urges a "no" vote on both questions, saying their vague wording "could prevent election officials from using polling places in non-public buildings or even using tables, chairs, electrical

Splinters from the Board

In February Dave Becker of the Endowment Fund Task Force joined the Board of Trustees to discuss the communication plan for explaining the structure of the Endowment Fund trust to the congregation and how the concept of principle protection was enacted. Details forthcoming.

The Board determined Church compliance with Limitations 4.8 and 4.9, which have to do with Minister Well-Being as well as Communication and Support of the Board. Staff Compensation and Staffing Changes were also considered. The Board discussed the options of working toward compliance with the national Unitarian Universalist Association's cost of living and compensation guidelines, while also closing the gap between our church's expenses and revenue stream. The Board will vote on this in March, when the pledge drive amounts have been submitted.

In committee updates, the Anti-Racism Team is nominating local black lead and POC focused organizations for Share the Plate. The Board's Congregational Survey Committee has finalized the new Congregational Survey, which will be released soon.

The food is transported, sorted and stored at each campus before it is distributed to nearly 400 pantries and meal programs across 35 eastern Wisconsin counties.
