The Hanan Refugees Relief Group is an international charitable organization with an active branch in Wisconsin. Dedicated to both short- and long-term solutions, the organization provides social services that include the problem of food insecurity as well as English as a Second Language programs for adults. Their goal is to transition refugees into contributing members of their host communities by providing long-term solutions, such as housing, labor opportunities, and medical relief.

The group consists of dedicated volunteers that join together for the sole purpose of aiding refugees and people in need. Staff and volunteers help with the mentoring, shopping, housing, employment, and health care. 100% of donations go directly towards charitable supplies. All overhead, including travel and administrative expenses, are paid for by the volunteers. Volunteers are welcome, including youth to babysit during the ESL classes.

Dena's Digressions

Some people live primarily in their mind, some live in their emotions, some in their body. If thinking is your happy place, perhaps you live in your head. If feelings flow freely and inform your actions, perhaps you live in your heart. If you encounter the world primarily through touch or learn best through doing, perhaps you live in your body. Yet everyone has a body. Most everything we perceive comes through the senses in our bodies. Why are we sometimes disassociated or otherwise unaware of our bodies? That, my friends, is a complicated question to answer, heavily influenced by culture, history, philosophy and religion.

Our theme in August is Embodiment – a word that gets tossed around frequently. But what does it mean? Embodiment means to give body to a spirit, so body and spirit are connected. We enter this world through a body and become a body to live. Our body is the last thing we relinquish when we die. Some believe that body and spirit disconnect after death and a person's spirit lives on in a disembodied state.

Choreographer Martha Graham said, "The body is a sacred garment. It's your first and last garment; it is what you enter life in and what you depart life with, and it should be treated with honor."

How might you treat your body with honor? What would it be like to love your body as it is? What do you need to do in your life to be able to listen to what your body tells you?

I believe our bodies hold much wisdom and if we could only unlock that wisdom, we'd be able to integrate mind, emotions, body and spirit into wholeness. Perhaps you have a physical spiritual practice that helps you do that, such as yoga, walking, tai chi, dance, singing, making art, cooking, or mindful eating.

As the summer flies by, try slowing down, go the speed of the body, listen to its wisdom, and find out what it has to tell you at any given moment.

Welcome to First Church Religious Education 2024-25!

We are excited to offer our religious education program for children and youth starting on Ingathering Sunday on September 8th! We encourage families to take advantage of our early registration discount of \$25 and sign up today. Our program is designed to provide children with a safe and nurturing environment to explore their spirituality and learn about our UU values.

All Religious Education programs for children over 5 years of age begin at 9:00 a.m. only during the first Sunday service. After our time together in the sanctuary, children, youth participants and RE volunteers will depart for the RE programs, beginning in the Leenhouts Common Room and then moving to the lower level. The lower level offers two options for most Sundays, which are UU Play or UU Maker Space, until 10:15 a.m. Additionally, other options such as All Ages Sunday and special workshops will be available on some Sundays.

For children under the age of five, the Nursery and Preschool will be open from 8:45 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. during the first service, and from 10:45 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. during the second service.

We are planning to offer OWL classes this year for 4-6th grade and 10-12 grade. Please indicate your family's interest in these programs during registration. The Youth Group (ages 13-18) will meet throughout the year, the schedule to be determined. Youth are always welcome to join the activities in All Ages, UU Play and UU Maker Space.

Registration cost for the entire year is \$50 per child for members, maximum cost is \$100 per family for the year. If your family could use a full or partial fee waiver, please do not hesitate to contact Minister of Religious Education Rev. Kimberlee Tomczak Carlson. We never turn a family away!

Religious Education depends on volunteers sharing their wisdom, energy, and time with our children. We ask all families to contribute to the RE program by being one of the 8-13 people First Church needs each Sunday to create our RE program. New RE volunteers can register here.

What a weekend October 5-6 is going to be at First Church!

That's the weekend we will be holding our Climate Justice Revival. In addition to the Climate Revival, Lea Morris, beloved musician of our pandemic-time services on YouTube, is going to be our Morter Lecturer on October 5, and coleading the service with Rev. Jennifer on October 6. She has been commissioned by the UUA to write the song to celebrate the Revival.

What will the Climate Revival Be Like? The UU Climate Justice Revival will take place in congregations and communities across the country. Although each congregation's revival will look a little different, everyone will engage in the same process with the same resources.

Day 1: Facilitated Conversations

Designed to nourish relationships, make connections, build capacity, vision the future, and chart a course of actions, these facilitated conversations will include creative engagements, music, relationship-building activities, and congregational connections that will advance intersectional climate actions with justice at the center.

Day 2: Worship and Advocacy

The UU Climate Justice Revival worship services will engage the whole congregation with the same spirit of intention as the dialogs. Following worship services, congregations will join a national advocacy hour.

Your First Church planning team is "preparing the soil" and "planting the seeds" so that our congregation can "grow together"!

Many GOTV Canvassers Will Be Needed Soon

Common Ground and First Church's Defend Democracy action group are teaming up to help over 30,000 people to vote in the November election. A major part of the plan is to visit every public housing location in Milwaukee to make sure residents are registered and to assist them with voting. That includes knocking on 11,000 doors of families in public housing or receiving rent assistance.

In addition, we will be asking residents if they have any issues with plumbing, rodents, insects, security, etc. that have not been addressed by the Housing Authority. If so, we will assist them with getting these issues resolved.

We will start visiting the public housing locations in late August and continuing up to the election. People will be working in pairs in four hour shifts on Saturdays and Sundays. Training will be provided.

If you are passionate about the outcome of this election, you will have opportunities to sign up at the Social Justice table and on-line. We will be having an assembly on August 19th, 6:00 to 7:30 to kick off our GOTV campaign. Details to follow as we get further into August.

Knocking on that many doors will require a lot of volunteers. First Church has shown up many times before. Let's do it again!

Tax Exempt Status Granted by IRS for Endowment Fund

Good news! In June, earlier than expected (we were aiming for September), the trustees of the First Unitarian Society of Milwaukee Endowment Fund- Dave Becker, Ron Oshima, and Betty Shroeder - received notice from the IRS that our endowment fund is officially recognized as a 501 (c)(3) entity. This means that dollars can now be transferred to the endowment without losing its charitable donation status.

Next steps

Once all three trustees are back in town, we will meet with the Finance Team to create a plan for transferring the endowment assets collected so far into the trust.

As of June 14, 2024, here's the current status of the Endowment Fund:
Pledge total \$2.7mm
Expected pledge total after shrinkage \$2.6mm
Total funds collected to date \$1.6mm

The goal of our endowment is to help eliminate our annual operating deficits and insure the strength and vitality of our congregation, enabling us to continue connecting, caring, learning and growing, and joining with others in making a positive impact on the world.
