

Share the Plate March 2025

Plastic-Free MKE is a coalition of dedicated community volunteers, non-profit organizations, government agencies, and businesses. Their goal is to reduce single-use plastics in Milwaukee and surrounding communities. As a coalition, they can advocate for policy changes and make it known to local legislators that plastic harms our health, water, and environment.

Their mission is to reduce the harms that unnecessary plastics have on environmental health, public health, and social justice. They will center those most harmed by plastics, build a community around plastics alternatives, advocate for producer and polluter accountability, and use collaborative problem-solving to eliminate plastics in the Milwaukee area. Rather than focus on individuals who use plastic, they focus on the companies producing harmful, unnecessary single-use plastics and the legislation making it harder to encourage companies to do better.

Their vision and values center on a healthier Milwaukee, centering those most impacted by the harms of single-use plastics.

Dear Beloveds,

In the midst of this unprecedented attack on democracy and our Unitarian Universalist values, it is hard to talk about trust. And yet, we need trust the most in times of fear and uncertainty. We learn who and what we can trust under pressure. Where are you finding security in the moment? What makes you feel grounded?

It can help to find something larger than yourself to trust, whether it be time, or the universe, or tomorrow's sunrise. In fall worship, we sang Rev. Dr. Rebecca Ann Parker's prayer, "There is a love holding us. There is a love holding all we love. There is a love holding all."

The love that holds us is larger than any individual moment, heartbeat, or relationship. It is a love within, among, and beyond us that holds all that is. Love returns again and again, through tragedy, death, and even fascism. There are also smaller places to find trust: in friendships, in community, and in the people who show up. Invest in these places, and keep building relationships and communities of trust. This is what holds us through the stress of oppression, loss, and grief. We had hiked to the other side of the island to watch the sunset and tarried long, basking in the beauty and many conversations and jokes between friends. Suddenly, it was dark and time to head back to camp. Not one of us had brought a flashlight! We decided our only choice was to do a trust walk. Single file, each of us touching the shoulder of the person in front of us, we slowly and carefully walked down the path through the woods. There was no choice but to trust the leader and the person right in front of us. There was no choice but to be trustworthy for the person behind us. There was no choice but to trust our feet. I'll never forget that unplanned trust walk in the dark through the forest with my fellow campers. We were capable of more than we thought we were, and we got each other safely home.

In times of national trauma, like the COVID-19 pandemic, like the assault on democracy now, I think my only choice is to touch the shoulder of the person I trust in front of me, and walk the slow walk through it. Who do you trust most right now? Can you lean on them a little more? Can you be the sturdy shoulder for someone else who needs courage? I know we'll find our way through the woods, it just doesn't seem like it now. One of the things I'm most grateful for these days are the leaders at First Church—staff, ministers, members. Strong, compassionate, flexible, vibrant, faithful, adapting. We will be blessed to send Rev. Kimberlee off on her short sabbatical beginning right after RE Sunday in May, trusting her to nourish her spirit, replenish her energy, engage her mind and care for her body away from church. We trust our lay leaders on the CRE team and our RE staff to carry the program for our children through the summer and welcome Kimberlee when she returns with renewed vision and plans on August 1. Sabbatical is the best gift to sustain our ministers and our ministry.

Trust is the key ingredient in making church work. We place our faith in each other, our values and this community to collectively nurture spirits, engage minds and inspire action. For a long time now First Church has been a sanctuary; a place where so many people have come to find solace, learn, grow, sing and center love collectively. I often find myself in awe of this legacy of trust. Together we shape lives, support one another and make real the community we all share with the key ingredient of trust.

Planning for my sabbatical, I return to reflecting on this relationship of trust. It is amazing to know in my bones that everyone will continue to support our children and youth in my absence. And I promise to continue to dedicate myself to serving this congregation and return thankful for the gift of rest and renewal.

The first half of my five-month sabbatical will begin on May 20, directly after the RE Sunday service and our First Church Annual Meeting on May 18. My sabbatical time will be divided across two years to ensure the continuity in religious education. I will return on August 1, 2025, a month before the church year calendar begins; Ingathering is September 7, 2025. The month allows time to collaborate on Sunday programming as well as recruit, train and schedule volunteers to help in the nursery, pre-school, elementary ages group, and youth group starting on Sunday mornings in September.

The CRE team. RE volunteers, church staff and I are planning for an all-ages program each of the Sundays during my sabbatical. Each Sunday will feature an all-ages activity led by an experienced volunteer and Fiona Higgins. During this time, Fiona will be taking on more administrative duties such as continuing the RE Weekly Update, supporting our volunteers and families and her hours will increase to reflect these added responsibilities. Rev. Jennifer will be supervising Fiona, Mariah and Cecelia until I return in August.

The PlasticFreeMKE consortium is a grassroots movement of 45 different non-profits, businesses, and government agencies with a mission to reduce unnecessary single-use plastics. A product of fossil fuels, single-use plastics are invading our water supply, our food, our environment -- and our bodies! In anticipation of Earth Month (April) members of the Earth Justice Ministry (EJM) will be promoting the goals of PlasticFreeMKE during social hours on Sundays, March 16, 23, and 30. Getting Your Ducks in a Row Register by March 9!

Many of us think that end-of-life planning is only a concern for the elderly. It is, but anyone who has dependents, especially minor children, must also be prepared, just in case. Whether you have children or not, getting your end-of-life plans in place will give you peace of mind and save your loved ones unnecessary stress when the time comes.

If your ducks aren't lined up, if you aren't even sure which ducks you need, join the Heritage Society for a three-part program that will give you this important information.

- Wednesday, March 12, church member Dr. Brett Twente will discuss the medical issues related to end-of-life planning and how to prepare a medical power of attorney.
- Wednesday, March 19, attorney and church member Rollie Hansen will discuss wills and probate, financial power of attorney, trusts (including special needs trusts), and Title 19/ Medicaid planning.
- Wednesday, March 26, Rev. Dena McPhetres will discuss spiritual aspects, such as how to talk with your loved ones about your final wishes, your beliefs about death and afterlife, your choices for disposition of your body after death, memorial service or funeral plans, and why we procrastinate these conversations.

Each program runs 6:30 – 8:00 p.m. in Max Otto Hall upstairs which has hearing assist devices and is accessible via stairs or elevator. The programs will NOT be livestreamed or recorded. The cost for the three-part series is \$30.00. To request a fee waiver, contact Rev. Dena at dena.mcphetres@uumilwaukee.org. Unfortunately, we are not able to provide childcare. The required online Facilitator training with the Soul Matters team happens in August or September. Theme Circles begin meeting the third week of October. People with diverse identities are especially encouraged to apply!



All in the Family


Life is hard sometimes. We experience sickness, job loss, broken hearts, and broken bodies. We want to support you through those difficult times.
