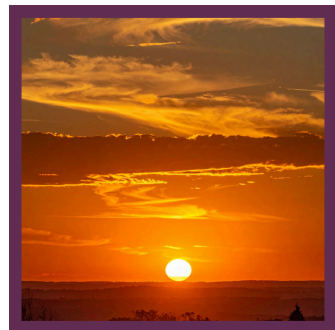

Across the Twin Cities, local families are facing detention, separation, and displacement due to these extreme ICE enforcement actions. Now, many in the community are facing an urgent financial crisis: the rent is due, fridges are empty, and basic household expenses are piling up.

Friends and neighbors came together to create Neighbors Helping Neighbors, a community-led support network rooted in mutual aid. We are powered by volunteers and many others who have brought people together in the spirit of care and community. 100% of all donations, after processing your contribution, go directly towards the rental assistance program, groceries, and other necessities for neighbors who cannot safely leave their homes – and towards the administrative work needed to get this support to families.

There are news reports that some ICE agents may leave Minneapolis in the coming weeks, and we hope that's true. As we work to make ourselves whole again, right now thousands of families in Minneapolis are behind on rent and urgently need your support.

What is your attention worth?

This past month I have had the privilege of exploring the theme of Paying Attention with our Youth Group in preparation for their upcoming Youth Sunday service. Our conversations explored the Attention Economy, what it is and how it works, and that topic, well it just *slayed*.

Our intake of world issues constantly tugs at our focus and heightens our anxiety. Every social media scroll, every news update, every subscription ping is part of a global economic system where our distraction is the commodity. The modern attention economy is built on monetizing human focus and is a massive industry worth over \$100 billion annually.

Our time is valuable, yet attention may be a truer measure of value. Someone can be physically with us yet not mentally present or spiritually engaged. When it happens, we know it at our core as we feel it is more than the time offered; it is the quality of attention that holds meaning and connection. Kairos time rather than Chronos time.

Spiritually, our attention is sacred; it is much more than a scarce economic resource. Attention to people builds relationships and community. Attention to our inner life shapes our meaning making, wellbeing and our sense of purpose. As we strive to be caregivers for our families, our community, ourselves, and our world, it is our awareness that guides and strengthens all our efforts.

Cultivating meaningful attention takes practice, one we nurture together. I know, it is almost always those I love that tug me away from screens to being present with them, for which I am always grateful, even if a bit reluctant. This month, I warmly invite you to stretch into practice, perhaps with these events offered on Sundays at First Church.

March 8: Our Youth Service promises to slay and offer a chance to learn what the next generation is noticing, valuing, and focusing on. Through their lived experiences, they'll share what matters most to them and why.

March 1, 11:30 a.m.: If you feel called to pay loving attention to the next generation, Faith Formation orientation is a wonderful place to begin!

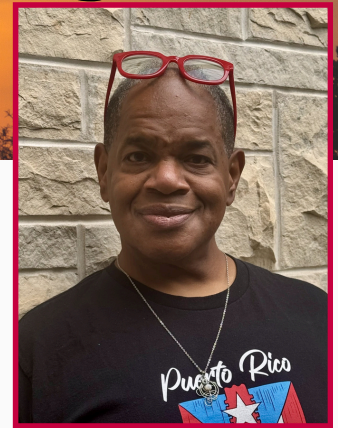

Hearts on Fire 2026

Hearts on Fire is a faith-development opportunity for high school seniors to meet with our minister and church staff as they explore their beliefs and craft a personal credo.



The Latin root credo means “I believe,” but a more heartfelt translation is: “what I set my heart to.” Creating a credo invites our youth to reflect deeply on what they trust, what they value, and what greater purposes they believe life offers. This is a unique and powerful Unitarian Universalist rite of passage—a time to reflect on who we are and who we hope to become—one we hope our young people will return to throughout their lives.

There will be three small-group sessions, followed by personal coaching with Rev. Kimberlee as needed to complete the credo process.

This year's sessions will be:

- Sunday, May 3 (10:15–11:00 am in person)

Mindfulness Meditation

Splinters from the Board

The Board of Trustees met on January 27 to continue its governance work in support of the mission and ministry of the First Unitarian Society of Milwaukee. During the meeting, the Board approved the minutes from the December meeting, formally elected Mark Bishop as treasurer, and approved compliance with Financial Planning and Financial Condition policies following a high-level review of the church's financial health.

The Board received a Forge Our Future Endowment report confirming that the Endowment Fund remains secure and well positioned to support the church long term, while noting the need to recruit a new Endowment Trustee as one term expires this year. The Board also approved a housing allowance adjustment for Rev. Kimberlee.

The Rev. Jennifer Nordstrom reported strong momentum across church life, with operations stabilizing under new leadership, long-delayed facilities projects moving forward, and stewardship efforts gaining energy. Worship attendance continues to outpace last year both in person and online, faith formation and pastoral care remain vibrant, and the congregation has stepped into visible regional leadership through nonviolence training and ministerial solidarity in Minneapolis.

The Board extends its sincere thanks to the congregation for the strong participation in the Ends Revision process. More information about the Ends will be shared as the Board reviews the responses and data collected and continues its discernment.

Climate Change and the Wicked Problem of Hyperscale Data Centers

David H. Petering-UWM Distinguished Professor of Chemistry and Biochemistry Emeritus

Hyperscale data centers house energy-intensive applications of artificial intelligence (AI) such as Chatgpt. Each requires electricity rivaling that of a large city. AI challenges the function of many parts of our society. Similarly, the immense demand of data centers for energy puts at risk society's efforts to limit climate change. Therein lies the wicked problem of data centers. The intersection of data center proliferation in SE Wisconsin and We Energies' attempts to meet its responsibilities as an energy utility provide the focus for this presentation. How they interact in Wisconsin models the issues of data centers and energy generation nationwide.
